But all those changes we achieved in 2022 would have been an illusion without the trust and support of the funding partners, the cooperation of the beneficiaries, the support of the concern national line agencies, local governments units and all those directly or indirectly involved in making change out of the projects implemented. You all deserve our heartfelt thanks and commendation as we aspire in bringing change for the common good for our people and the nation.

Message from the


OPERATIONS MANAGER

It adopts a people-centered, community-based, integrated and sustainable development framework.

MARADECA believes that development must be a concerted effort by all stakeholders, and the voice for change has to come from the communities themselves.

MARADECA Inc. was founded on June 1998, through the collective efforts of concerned individuals. It was registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) in Cagayan de Oro City on August 26, 1999 with Registration No. H199900444. Currently, it has 99 employees and 31 interns.

It has been duly accredited by national, regional and provincial government agencies such as the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), BARMM Ministry of Social Services and Development, Bangsamoro Economic Development Council and the provincial government of Lanao del Sur. 



A Glimpse of 2022

The 2022 was politically-charged, challenges, and hope-packed year. It was a year that saw the accession to power of Ferdinand R. Marcos, Jr. after winning in the May 9 National Election, whose father was unceremoniously ousted as the 10th president whose presidency run through a period of twenty- one (21) long years. Alongside the national election was the local election that also brought changes to local leadership in some of the municipalities. It was also the same year that the new set of members of the Bangsamoro Transitional Authority (BTA) were appointed as provided by Republic Act No. 11593 resetting the first regular elections in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao.

Although MARADECA has no political inclination in terms of candidates and political party preferences but its participation in elections as monitoring body is crucial in safeguarding the peoples' right of suffrage. And, in the performance of its sacred duty it exposed itself into tremendous pressures of the politicians using unconventional means in trying to gain or regain advantage or edge at the expense of fair and honest electoral processes, including the restricting of monitoring bodies access to information.

The change of leadership in some of the local governments units (LGUs) as a result of the election and the appointment of new members of the BTA necessitates lot of adjustments for MARADECA in the approaches in dealing with the new leadership and their new sets of


development agenda. But our long years of experiences and openness in adapting emerging political environment even more strengthen our resolve in filling the gaps in the delivery of socioeconomic services of the government.

The year 2022 also saw the displacement of 513,000 families or 1,947,000 individuals from Southern Leyte and the Caraga region due to typhoon Odette that hit the country on December 16, 2021 while in Mindanao alone 382,000 is reported to have been displaced due to conflict or natural disaster. In all the disasters it expanded the reach of MARADECA to as far as the Surigao provinces delivering relief and assistance, both material and financial. Even psycho-social services to deserving women and children were provided by MARADECA, thanks to the financial support of humanitarian organizations.

Finally, the year 2022 is a year of continuing recovery for the displaced residents from the 24 Barangays of Marawi City, who were displaced due to the 153 days of the siege of the city. In all these years, from 2017 to 2022, MARADECA have been consistently providing assistance through various projects to the internally displace persons (IDPs). It is also a year of recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic that almost strangle the economy of the nation into halt. Again, despite of all the risks MARADECA found itself braving the unexpected dangers if only to serve the deserving communities in their attempts of recovering from the pandemic.

OUR ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN CSD PROGRAM















Organized, trained and mobilized 60 IDPs from among the survivors of Typhoon Odette in CARAGA to be Women Friendly Space (WFS) facilitators. WFS facilitators provided roll-out orientation and awareness-raising seminars to 5,404 women/girls and 9,944 men/boys. Provided cash for work to WFS facilitators. Organized a multidisciplinary team that supported **GBV** victims fast-track in filing their cases. Seventeen GBV survivors were assisted for psychosocial evaluation and therapy, Posted 125 tarpaulins on GBV Referral pathways support to institutionalization of GBV in emergencies with the LCAT-VAWC.

Organized, trained and mobilized 90 community champions in the 3 municipalities of Lanao del Sur. They reached out to 4,154 individuals from 675 families in the family conversation community masuwara on Family Planning and Reproductive Health. Conducted series of community-based monthly meetings and peer counselling in 45 barangays. Conducted the first Family Planning Summit in the province which was attended by stakeholders and 416 individual-receptors of family planning.





Because she thought that it was against Islam when a woman adapts family planning, all her life was about giving birth almost every year and going to the hospital is not in her list

Even in 2021 when she faced health risk during her last pregnancy, Rakimah Odi Bantasan, 34 years old, hesitated to be admitted to the hospital.

After that last pregnancy, Bantasan adapting family considered planning, especially with growing family of seven children, when the nurse from the Rural Health Unit recommended it to her during a house-to-house visit.

She eventually disregarded the nurse's advice because she thought it went against Islamic teaching. She said she gave birth at home with a komadrona (traditional hilot).

Bantasan is a fulltime housewife while her husband work as a farmer in Barangay Madaya, Lumbatan Lanao del Sur.

Things changed lately though. When MARADECA introduced family planning, its Islamic perspective, and conducted a series of activities like peer counseling and family conversation, she was enlightened.

She became active in the seminars and decided to take part in family planning, along with her husband. She became an acceptor of family planning under the project Inclusive Family Planning in partrnerships with BARMM Health.

"Before, I hardly ever went to family gatherings or community events because of my yearly pregnancies, but now I am much better able to do other jobs besides housework, like helping my husband on the farm, fulfilling social obligations and more time taking care of my children unlike before. I'm grateful to MARADECA for enlightening me on the importance of family planning," Bantasan said.

What MARADECA Inc. did in the aftermath of the terrorist attack in Marawi City in 2017 would find deep inspiration among the barangay officials of Mantapoli, in the municipality of Marantao in Lanao del Sur.

Mantapoli Barangay Chairperson Casar Abinal said he would not forget the comfort and convenience to his constituents the things that MARADECA Inc, gave them as part of the help project of the organization.

"I wanted to continue what MARADECA Inc. has started in our barangay, It has been my partner in the development of my community," he said.

Barangay Mantapoli, 19 kilometers southwest of Marawi City, was one of the barangays provided assistance by the Marawi Response Project of MARADECA Inc., which was carried out from 2018 to 2022. This project was in collaboration with Plan International.

MARADECA Inc. was among the humanitarian organizations that responded to the impact of the armed siege of Marawi City mounted by the Maute Group and Abu Sayyaf from May to October of 2017. MARADECA and other humanitarian responders offered relief aid to

the affected people in Lanao del Sur.

"We thought that its [MARADECA] support would eventually come to an end," Abinal said. Rather, it was just the beginning of our barangay partrnerships, he added.

"On behalf of my constituents, I expressed my warmth gratitude to MARADECA Inc. and its partner donor for the various trainings provided and the community facility grant support given to us," Abinal said.

He said the assistance brought "significant change" to the people of Mantapoli. "The community facilities like chairs, tables, sounds systems were utilized in every community meetings, gatherings like weddings and settling barangay conflicts," Abinal said.

Some of these assistances were bakery items and sewing machines, given as grant as income generating project to help the daily needs of the beneficiary families.

"Thank you so much to MARADECA for the unwavering assistance and support to the marginalized families of Barangay Mantapoli," Abinal said.







Changed lives

From timid, shy and introvert individuals, members of the Maranao Bolayoka Youth Organization (MBYO) have blossomed into more confident youth to lead outreach programs and interact with the coummunities in need.

"We never thought that the grant support we have received will change our lives as individual and as a group," said Norlaila Abdulganie, 33 years old, and president of MBYO.

Before the intervention provided by MARADECA Inc. to the organization and the community, Abdulganie admitted she was timid and aloof. But as she has to lead the organization to interact with other youth and the community, "my self-esteem was developed and I can now confidently lead the group".

"Thank you so much to MARADECA for this lifelong opportunities and experience," she added.

The MBYO interacts and deals with other youth through the series of seminars and as members of the MBYO were also trained earlier for capacity development.

"I am a typical youth in the barangay that my daily routine was house-school person and I barely mingle with the other youth," said Anady M. Kiram, the 30-year-old secretary of the organization.

But because of MARADECA and the series of trainings, "I gained self-confidence and develop leadership as I was choosen as MBYO secretary"

Abdulganie and Kiram said they want their group to

expand their income-generation activities to event organizing, like weddings, "so that we can recruit more members and help out more youth in their barangays".

The MBYO is located in Barangay Sugod, Madalum, Lanao del Sur. It is one of the 300 youth and Community Solidarity Groups (CSGs) that Maradeca Inc. organized under the Marawi Response Project. This was undertaken with Plan International.

MBYO has 22 members, with the youngest member at 16 years old and the oldest at 33 years old. The group was organized during the siege of Marawi City by local terror groups in 2017. Many MBYO members are evacuees, or internally displaced persons, or host IDPs. They were given a series of capacity development trainings and in the year 2020 they received their community facility grants support such as chairs, tables, tent and whiteboard.

The items were soon utilized by the communities for activities like meetings and Islamic seminar. Later on they used the donated items to generate income for their organization, as they tapped potential clients from neighboring barangays.

For example, their Tables and Chairs Rental generated P144,000 income. From their income, they were able to donate 10 chairs to the madrasah school of their barangay. They also conducted clean-up drives in collaboration with the barangay local government, and conducted Islamic seminar every Ramadhan and provided free of use of their tables and chair in every community activity.



Alican Condaraan, 55 years old, is the first to use the thresher that his organization was able to receive in donation when it was formed in Barangay Sapingit, Municipality of Piagapo, Lanao del Sur.

"As a member of Salapidao ko Masa, I was the first to use the rice thresher during my farm harvest and it helped me a lot to lessen my farm input expenses like equipment rental instead spending food for the table of my Family." Alican said.

A landless farmer, he said farming without adequate farm tools and equipment was difficult. I "have to spend a lot of money renting threshers from other barangays," he said. Aside from that, he rents the farm he is tilling, on a 1/3-2/3 sharing in favor of the farmer.

When it was formed into a farmers organization - the Salapidao ko Masa received a thresher from MARADECA Inc. "I am incredibly grateful to MARADECA and its partner donor for its assistance with the farm equipment grant.

While he waits for the farm's harvest, which

typically occurs three months after planting, Alican occasionally works as a carpenter to add to his primary source of income, which is rice farming. He recently harvested his two hectares of a rented farm field and harvested 50 bags of rice. (Under the sharing scheme, Alican should get 2/3 of the earning. Each sack is 35 kilos and sold at P18 a kilo, for a total of P31,500. Alican gets P21,000 while the landlord gets P10,500).

From his farm earnings, Alican donated P4,000 to the cooperative, which will be used for their organization's income-generating project. The organization has a policy that each member will contribute money for each time agricultural machinery is used. The fund will be used for equipment maintenance and possible income generating projects. "I am happy to share to my groups what I have earned and looking forward our group will flourish and have procure more equipments or farm animals like Carabao, which are crucial for the member farmers' farm work," Alican said.



PATHWAYS TO CHANGE

Before, the children of Abdulbasit M. Alulung, 50, years old, would rather help him in the farm in Barangay Gadongan, in the municipality of Madalum in Lanao del Sur, than go to school. This was because the nearest school was in the next barangay Pagayawan, about one kilometer away. Their residence and their farm is in a mountainous area that makes it doubly difficult for his children to chose school on a daily basis.

Abdulbasit is married to Norkisah Ampaso, 49 years old, and they have six children in their 20 years of marital union.

Living in the mountainous area has also made it difficult for the family to avail of basic services and whatever trickle the basic services would come were often seen as luxury. They eke out a living through farming and sometimes, he would do extra work as a carpenter.

It came as a blessing for the family, and other residents as well of the village, with the Barangay Gadongan was identified as one of the recipients of the project of MARADECA Inc. and Pathways-Palladium. The project was entitled Increase Access of Marginalized Children to Kto3 Education through Community Support, or I-ACCESS to Kindergarten Education.

The project involved the construction of a learning center in the identified barangay.

"As a parent of 4 learners, I am grateful for the learning center and the continuous support of MARADECA and its partner funder to deliver quality and accessible education to our children," he said in the vernacular.

His wife, Norkisah, said she was more assured now of the education of his children with the establishment of the learning center "since the children were also provided with school uniform, school supply and other materials which has eased our burden as parents".

Abdulbasit said he appreciated the time, care and commitment of the teachers to the learners every day. Although money was tight, he said he was still able to send his children to school although they have to stop due to the distance of the school from their residence, and the financial difficulty.

"Education is worth pursuing. The ability to learn is a gift, a responsibility and not to take it for granted," he said.

Auditor's Opinion

I have audited the financial statement of Maranao People Development Center (MARADECA), Inc. hereinafter known as the Entity, which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2022 and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of change in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion the accompanying financial statement present fairly, in all material respect, the financial position of the Entity as of December 31, 2022, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the Philippine Financial Reporting Standards for small and Medium-Sized Entities (PFRS for SMEs)

Basic for Opinion

I conducted my audit in accordance with Philippine standards on auditing (PSAs). My responsibilities under those standards are further described in auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statement section of my report. I am independent of the entity in accordance with the Philippine Ethics Standard Board for accountants(PESBA Code) together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statement in the Philippine, the code of ethics for professional accountants in the Philippines, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with this requirements, I believe that the audit evidence I have obtain is sufficient and appropriate to provide basis of my opinion.

Responsibility of management and those charged with governance for the financial statement

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statement in accordance with Philippine financial reporting standards for small and Medium-Sized Entities (PFRS for SMEs, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intendeds to liquidate the Entity or to cease operation, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Entity's financial reporting process.

Auditor's responsibility for the audit of the financial statement

My objective are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or errors, and to issue an auditor's report that include my opinion. Reasonable PSAs will always detect material misstatement when it exist. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error.

And are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit In accordance with PSAs, I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

Report on Legal and Other Regulatory Requirements


